"Passing on your left!" Bike helmets? Dogs on a leash?

One of the most wonderful features of the Illinois Prairie Path is its variety of trail users. You share the Path with people of all ages and interests - walkers, runners, bicyclists, horseback riders – and animals. Here are some important safety reminders.

- Keep to the right side of the Path.
- Speeding can startle other trail users, especially children and animals. If possible, try to make dog walkers and equestrians aware that you are approaching. Be especially cautious on narrow trail segments and on trail bridges.
- Riders and runners should travel in single file when passing other trail users. Please announce you're your intention to pass. Always pass on the left.
- All animals should be leashed and kept leashed.
 Owners need to clean up after them.
- Move off the trail when you are stopped or talking with groups of friends.
- Always wear a helmet when bicycling.
- No alcoholic beverages or controlled substances are allowed on the system. Motorized vehicles are prohibited.

Be aware of where you are on the Path. What city are you in? What mile markers did you recently pass? If an emergency occurs on the Path, please call 9-1-1 and



identify the location of the incident. Uniformed safety patrols - members of the Community Resource Unit in DuPage County - help ensure the safety of Path

In Memoriam Lennel Grace, Maywood

Lennel passed away on Monday, March 7th. He was 66 years old. Michael Romain, Editor of The Village Free Press, wrote: "There's a hole now in the heart of this village so big ...a hundred men couldn't fill it." He continued, "...Invariably, without fail, after having spoken with him, you would have learned something you never knew before, had several epiphanies; your life (if not your mind and if only marginally) having changed for the better." Lennel was an advocate of the Illinois Prairie Path, a community leader who organized and led Maywood's Annual Earth Day Cleanups and a former board member.

Doris Blickle, Wheaton



Doris recently passed away. She attended the Path's 2014 Annual Meeting and shared memories of working with her husband Fred and neighbors to <u>build</u> the Path off of Delles Road in Wheaton. Her daughter Alayne recalls, "I remember as a kid hauling wheel barrel loads of gravel out to the path, and raking it out by hand as mechanized machinery was not allowed. We spent many a Saturday doing that." Doris also remembered neighbors offering food and water to volunteers from their back yards, as they all worked, laying foot after foot, of new trail.
